Your fantastic team here, as always, has punched through it all & shone like the superstars they are. I am so proud & honoured to work with these people, who put so much of themselves into making our community a better place, If you feel you could contribute, or know someone who might be interested please let us know.

A big disappointment this year was our inability to secure the lease on an unused building in town. This would have enabled us to expand the scope & target age of our programs, to give better access for people who have trouble with transport & expand our ability to hire space with the potential to bring more trade into town & somewhere for youngsters to put their mind to good use. Unfortunately, it was not to be. However, thanks to State Member for Ripon, Martha Haylett's work on getting Government funding for us, we are in a position to at least fulfil some of these aspirations. With the addition of a demountable room to be sited at the front of the House, we can do more groups/ classes, & also let the space to local & visiting groups running programs to benefit the community.

Lots of large events were tackled this year. Such as The Biggest Morning Tea which outshone last year's attempt & will be an ongoing, & improving event.

Harmony Day was a huge success, with a packed hall & many different cultural foods on offer. It was great to see people from many different cultures laughing and joking together whilst sampling the delicious food.

Then came NAIDOC week & we really felt that we would like to participate. Luckily, having a proud 1st Nations woman on the staff she took charge and, with other volunteers, a bush tucker garden was laid out and planted, which is now thriving. Look out for Bush tucker scones coming out of the kitchen in the future. A yarnning circle was constructed. On the day the event was well attended by many stall holders, local radio, the Police & Ambulance services & live reptiles to meet. There was also Bush Tucker available, like Muffins & Cooked Roo, Croc & Emu. The Yarning Circle was opened by members of the Dja Dja Wurrung with a welcome to country & smoking ceremony. The Mayor gave a good speech about our need to work together & what had been achieved so far.

For Mental Health Week a promotional walk was organised through Maryborough. This was very well attended and helped to underline the widespread and debilitating disease.

I think that in hindsight the number of projects taken on was too much for the workforce available, yet still, they were pulled off.

You may see that I have omitted naming individuals in this report. Sometimes people stand out and need to be noticed, but this year everyone has stepped up. Some had bigger projects than others but big or small everyone has put their all into what they were doing and I thought it only fair to treat them all equally.

As well as all the special events taking place the core business of the house has still been ongoing. We are still running regular groups and hosting outside entities. A perpetual need of the community is food relief which is addressed daily at the house with no reduction, and in some cases recently, there has been an increase as cost of living angst hits more people.

Mandy & Bernie Cramer have been staunch supporters of the MCH for many years. They have both served on the Committee & I think Mandy has filled all the positions at some time or the other & is a fountain of knowledge. Many don't realise the extent of upfront & covert financial & in-kind donations they have made to the House. Also, Bernie, has provided many hours of work for the House, using his own paid man-power. We are very grateful for their support & as a mark of their esteem, the Committee unanimously agreed to make Bernie & Mandy Honorary Lifelong members of Maryborough Community House Inc.

MCH Inc. 2024 AGM Report – MCH Inc. Co-ordinator



Another year has passed at Maryborough Community House (MCH Inc.), with further layers unfolding of new events, programs, projects and many new faces welcomed amongst us. It has been a year where recovery still played its part in drawing people to the house for service assistance. MCH Inc. with a solid organisational history of over 40 years, continues to strengthen its presence and capacity in responsively meeting local resident needs for

those within its immediate neighbourhood and local surrounds. This year, the house added greater focus of orientation to its portfolio with community development styled projects such as volunteer led events, with these being an important preventative measure to complement relief and recovery services.

A major project the MCH Inc. Activity Hub Project got underway to provide additional venue space for extending on program and services. Project activities to secure venue space have been extensive and delivered activities in interim community space once earlier identified venues were no longer available. Efforts then were redirected towards an onsite portable at Primrose St. Maryborough to co-locate with existing onsite activities and ease of administration. (A separate report has been provided by the MCH Inc. Activity Hub Project Officer about the space activities activation and engagement through this period.)

New events were developed and delivered through MCH Inc. volunteer led projects, such as the MCH Inc. Walk for Well-Being event and MCH Inc. NAIDOC Week event. Events have brought about a lot of local front-page media coverage. These project events were substantial undertakings for our staff and volunteers, with immersion style project skills development, proving highly engaging with our local community. A new MCH Inc. Garage Sale was held, attracting local residents over a weekend. Not only did this clear some room for better facility access, it also provided a new fundraising effort for the house. The MCH Inc. Harmony Day was launched under the Taste of Harmony Day sharing international meals and resulted in offers from local residents to assist in catering for the following year to share Filipino cuisine and learnings about their culture.

The running of events acted also to build up a growing range of partnering activities of the house with community, business, government and government intermediary organisations through their delivery.

Together with our local community, we raised money and resources for others, such as a Biggest Morning Tea fundraiser with a Bric-a-Brac and Craft stall, towards the Cancer Council Victoria's work for people impacted by cancer. Our annual end of year MCH Inc. Christmas Hampers for families experiencing hardship, accompanied by distribution of Bags of Joy from MEC, was a fabulous effort, and backed by businesses and the community far and wide, including metro and rural regional assistance. Behind the scenes a development project to attain charitable Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status for the House got underway to set-up a further channel to strengthen access to philanthropic assistance for projects of the house.

The house's administration saw through implementation and upgrades of new IT systems including a new financial accounting system, Xero. The appointment of our new bookkeeper brought in new practices to complement this. Administration needs and associated activities grew rapidly with the increasing breadth of activities and projects underway.

Our regular programs continued to provide ongoing ways for locals to come along, connect with others, seek support and learn new skills. Activities covered Art, Tai Chi, volunteering, IT services, singing with Serendipity Choir, Chatty Café, cooking for Food Relief, including catering to hirers activities and the house's general programs. These were complemented with workshops and activities that came through from room hirers and new rounds of activities from the MCH Activity Hub project such as Drama, Hospitality training and an adventurous new Bus trip to Op Shops in Bendigo which was extremely popular.

Our feature Kitchen Garden has been lovingly tended by our volunteers, serving to inspire locals to grow homegrown produce in their own gardens. Participants from ASTERIA came along in late Autumn and began working up wicking beds at our front entranceway. A new indigenous botanical garden area was established through a house project to provide insights about local indigenous bush to bowl ingredients and local fauna attracting species that can be grown local to the area. A new gardening group sprang out of the event projects, assisting with gardens around the house, most eager to see a new Wattle Grove come about to showcase high protein wattle seeds varieties. Through the NAIDOC Week event a Yarning circle together with indigenous plant beds was also setup in adjacent Roscholler Park grounds.

The Maryborough Volunteer Resource Centre team's project helped the local community in elevating awareness of the integral role volunteers make to underpin their community They held forums and volunteer training workshops to strengthen skills and encouraged volunteer referrals across multiple volunteer-based organisations throughout the year.

Looking forward, there is a growing level of excitement anticipating the arrival of extended space on site to better equip and build on the great work which is now going on in Maryborough through Maryborough Community House's growing team who are contributing so much to their community.

I would like to thank all of our staff, volunteers, our board and members of the house and not to mention all those who have put in an extraordinary amount of work and dedication of their time towards this year's numerous achievements. Thank-you also to our funding partners, donors and business sponsors. The help that has come through in so many ways has been greatly appreciated to infuse and enrich all the work that has been undertaken through here. We look forward to the important year that now lies ahead.

Major funding

Following an election commitment by Martha Haylett MP, a grant of \$100,000 towards additional activity space was provided by the Department of Families, Fairness and Housing

Considerable effort has been undertaken towards implementation of this project. In the meantime, storage was improved by the purchase of a second shipping container.

Successfully organised major events have been a highlight for the year.

Thank you to the many people also providing supplementary storage space. Main room storage increased with 16 bay shelving constructed by volunteer Ernie Ollington, using material from SuperYard.

Special mentions

- Private donations of goods reached a nominal value exceeding \$12,000.
- The 2023 Victorian Neighbourhood House Survey details our output value in excess of \$1.1 million, from inputs of \$120,000, a tenfold delivery/funding measure
- The MCH Inc. Exception Food Service is funded primarily by the Community House. A \$500 donation was gratefully received from the Pyrenees Historic Car Club.
- MCH raised \$850 from the Biggest Morning Tea and sale of craft items, which was donated to the Cancer Foundation,
- Membership Fees for 2023/24 were held to \$2.00 (below 2015 levels).
- The new Xero accounting system has improved our desktop financial reporting. A huge “thank you” to Rosanne Stevens and Jeannie Clark for facilitating team work.

ACTIVITY HUB PROJECT

In 2023 Maryborough Community House successfully applied for funding from the Department of Families, Fairness and Housing for the Activity Hub Project. The application included the activation of an identified, unused community space, as an additional external campus of the House. Pivotal to this project was increasing the reach of the House, offering additional activities to community members who do not currently use the House. The fact that the House operates with one multi purpose room, three small shared offices and a kitchen, inhibits the capacity to offer an extensive range of activity choices or to respond to community education needs.

I was engaged as the Project Officer, having an extensive background in Adult, Community Education (ACE). Unfortunately the unused community space that we had identified was not available to us. We were offered use of the Railway Station Creative Space by the Central Goldfields Shire, which we were very appreciative of. River Gum Support Services also offered use of their two activity rooms. We also perused possible venue options but were not able to source anything suitable for expanding our operations. During this time we also considered the option of adding a portable building to our existing land space. The funding body agreed to this option and so our grant was updated to include the purchase and fit out of a training building.

The House has not really ventured into the user pay activity space, having limited capacity to do so. Instead they have focussed on providing support to House users and local community members. These supports include hosting support and activity groups, offering information sessions, tax help, energy rebates, food packages, information and referrals to external service providers. The House also has a strong focus on social support in that the “kettle is always on” and you can drop in anytime for a cuppa and a chat.

I was provided with an extensive suggestion list of possible activities and have attempted to work through this progressively. It became apparent that many people were now working as sole traders and were not willing to offer their services at the House as this could compromise their own small businesses. One possible Trainer advised she does not leave her business for the day for under \$1000. Other reasons quoted were the cost of fuel, travel time and the importance of family commitments.

I hit the streets, talking to the Job Network providers, asking people what they would like to see offered. It became apparent that there is no access/support for people who are studying out of the local area. Adult literacy was mentioned a few times. Jeannie and I met with Brian Gould, Economic Development Officer at the Shire. Brian spoke of the possible establishment of a learning hub in Maryborough to provide education to employment pathways and for skills training for local business. This project has been advertised recently. We also talked about the fact that there is no Adult Community and Further Education (ACFE) provider in Maryborough currently. Brian advised us to speak with the regional ACFE office, as regional funds sit with other providers in the Loddon Campaspe region.

In response to the findings I managed to procure a Volunteer who had some experience tutoring, and so the 1-1 Adult Literacy service was born! We signed up with the Reading, Writing Hotline and they will refer people to us who request assistance. They also offer free tutor training and access to resources. We have had quite a few enquiries for this service, demonstrating the need. Some of those who reached out for assistance were referred by Therapists and Job Network Providers. Unfortunately the prospective participants were not quite ready to take the plunge. When they are ready, so will we be. We currently have an ESL student undertaking the 1-1 sessions.

Other activities which were activated include: Heart Foundation Walking Group, Drama Workshops, Food Handling, Responsible Serving of Alcohol, Free Law Information, Financial Literacy, Gambling Harm Awareness and an Op Shop Tour to Bendigo. We are offering two courses in partnership with Castlemaine Community House, Microbusiness for Makers and Job Readiness for Mature Aged Jobseekers.

Most exciting is the news that we have recently procured a building to be situated on the area at the front of the House. We envisage that this will occur before the end of the Project in November, pending all required permits.

The Project has lifted our public profile. We plan to maintain this momentum once the new building is installed. It has been a pleasure to be back at the Maryborough Community House and to be involved in expanding the activity offerings for the community.
